

New York State is Transforming into Pinochet's Chile. The Disappearances Have Started.

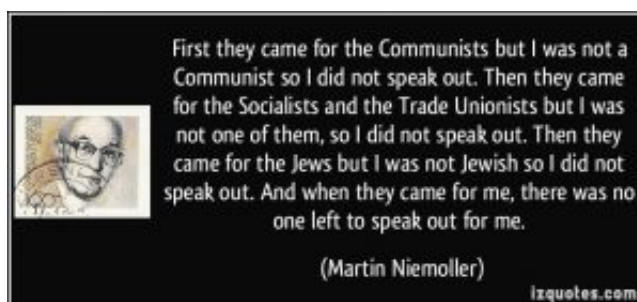

NYPD has staffed this new department, called the SGR, with officers who are notorious for unlawful repression of protests, and in part, with [military personnel previously in the chain of command at the Abu Ghraib prison](#) in Iraq during the time of the notorious human rights abuses.



Abu Ghraib was the infamous prison in Iraq where human rights violations against detainees included physical and sexual abuse, torture, rape, sodomy, and murder.[1][2][3][4] The abuses came to light with reports published in late 2003 by Amnesty International and the Associated Press. The incidents received widespread condemnation both within the United States and abroad.

In Pinochet's Chile, from its beginning, the government engaged in 'enforced disappearance' and implemented harsh measures against its perceived opponents (in other words [pre-crime](#)) which eventually evolved into [murdering many who were imprisoned](#)[5]. Up to 80,000 people [disappeared](#) and were interned and as many as 30,000 were tortured during the time Pinochet was in government.[6][7] As of 2011, the official number of deaths and forced disappearances stands at 3,065[8].
